# What are Montessori mobiles and why are they special?

Did you know that a newborn's **least developed sense is sight**? When they are born, their retina (that controls vision) is blurred because the neurons in their brain are not fully developed.





As a result, they can only see black and white colours and shades of grey. Their sight **gradually improves** in the following 6 months.

They were designed with only one purpose: to aid your little one's sight development, encompassing the **full range of visual skills**.

Each of them offers just the right amount of stimuli so that the sense of sight is challenged, but not overwhelmed.



Babies have to **practice coordinating their eyes**, how to focus and move them accurately. This is the first step in the long process of understanding the world around them.

By learning how to use the visual information that the brain receives, they will prepare the way to use this stimulation to **reach** and then later to try to **grab**.





That's when the Tactile Mobiles come to play. Their job is to help your baby's fine-and gross motor skills in a gradual, step-by-step manner. You will see how your baby develops from one day to another just by offering the right stimulus.

The Sensory Toys seemlessly follow the development from here onwards.

# The sequence of the mobiles

By giving your baby the right mobile at the right developmental phase, you assist their development.

This external, age and skill appropriate stimuli promotes the growth of neurological connections in the brain. This in turn enables effective communication of information which is the basis of learning and memory.

The list is not exhaustive, there are many other mobiles that ease the progression from one big milestone to another, however I believe that these are the most important ones with the biggest developmental benefits.



# **MUNARI MOBILE**


**Why:** For the tinies babies who are only able to see close, strongly contrasting 2D objects.

**Visual skill focus:** Focusing eyes, visual tracking, building concentration.

#### **OCTAHEDRON**

**Why:** To aid colour vision development. Colours are still very contrasting, but your baby can already perceive the difference.


**Visual skill focus:** Visual discrimination, moving from 2D to 3D.



#### **GOBBI**

**Why:** To distinguish the shades of one single colour.


**Visual skill focus:** Refining visual discrimination.



#### **DANCERS**

**Why:** Encourages observation of moving objects with independent elements.

**Visual skill focus:** Depth perception, visual tracking of an object.





# **WHALE MOBILE**

**Why:** Offers real-life images, refines visual skills

**Visual skill focus:** Refines the visual skills babies have acquired with the previous mobiles in an 'entry level', in black and white.

# **SWALLOWS MOBILE**


**Why:** Offers real-life images, the small red detail encourages close observation.

**Visual skill focus:** It does everything that the Whales but with an added interest point babies have to focus on, the read 'beak'. This makes babies focus for longer and with more visual precision.

#### **BUTTERFLY MOBILE**

**Why:** Offers real-life images, the bold swirling colours stimulate all existing visual skills.

**Visual skill focus:** This mobile encompasses all the visual skills babies have learned in the first three months. This is the most complex visual challenge'.

#### **BELL ON A RIBBON**


Why: Encourages reaching and batting.

**Skill focus:** Controlling uncontrolled movements, developing gross-motor skills, auditory skills, visual tracking, cause and effect.

#### **RING ON A RIBBON**

**Why:** Encourages grabbing and pulling.

**Skill focus:** Controlling uncontrolled movements, developing gross- and fine motor skills, strengthens hand- and core muscles.





#### **GRASPING BEADS**


**Why:** Teaches grasping, stimulates the tactile sense

**Skill focus:** Controlling uncontrolled movements, developing fine-motor skills, strengthens muscles in hands.

#### **MONTESSORI PUZZLE BALL**

**Why:** Encourages grabbing, holding, letting go, passing form one hand to another

**Skill focus:** Controlling uncontrolled movements, developing gross-motor skills, auditory skills, visual tracking.



# **Sensory toys**



#### **MONTESSORI BELL RATTLE**

**Why:** encourages the development of auditory and fine motor skills

**Skill focus:** Controlling uncontrolled movements, developing fine-motor skills, auditory skills, visual tracking, cause and effect, strengthens muscles in hands.

#### **CROCHET TEETHING RING**

Why: to stimulate the tactile sense AND to help aliviating the pain during teething
Skill focus: Development of fine motor skills

#### **CROCHETED BALLS**

**Why:** stimulates the tactile and visual sense, develops fine motor skills

**Skill focus:** manipulation of an object in a variety of ways.



# MONTESSORI OBJECT PERMANENCE BOX


**Why:** helps to understand the concept of object permanence

**Skill focus:** concentration, observation, body control, precise movements, handeye coordination and logical thinking skills, just to name a few.

#### **SENSORY BEAN BAGS**

**Why:** engages the senses, offers rich tactile and visual sensory experience


**Skill focus:** Thanks to the carefully chosen textured fabrics, each of them has a very distinctive feeling, providing a rich sensory experience.



#### **FABRIC SENSORY BALL**

**Why:** engages the senses, offers rich tactile and visual sensory experience

**Skill focus:** It has immense potential in helping the progression of your baby's development. Not only it trains all the five senses, but also many other areas in the body.



# Where To Hang The Mobiles

So you've got your montessori mobile but where to hang it? It mostly depends on the physical space you have at your disposal. Let's take a look at the options.

1. (



A FLEXIBLE CLAMP - It's relatively small, therefore easy to carry, however it's not very sturdy. I wouldn't hang tactile mobiles on it or anything even slightly heavy (visual mobiles are ok).

**AN ADHESIVE/COMMANDER HOOK** - A great way to hang stuff from the ceiling. It's quite strong so no need to worry about the weight of the mobile. This is your best choice if you live in a small, rented flat. Only for visual mobiles.

A CEILING C HOOK - A great option if you live in your own house/are allowed to make holes in the ceiling. Only for visual mobiles.

4.

A BABY GYM STYLE MOBILE HOLDER - This is my personal favourite and the one I always used with my own baby. It's aesthetically very appealing as well. Try to get a secondhand one if you can. Make sure that it's at least 60 cm tall and can be folded up for easy storage.

# How to hang the Montessori mobiles

Here are a few recommendations that you should follow before starting to use a mobile.

- ALWAYS supervise your baby when using a mobile.
- Hang it in the baby's waking space as it is meant to stimulate them instead of relaxing them.
- Present it when your baby is fully awake and calm so that they are ready to observe and focus on the mobile.
- Position the mobile above the baby's chest at a height of at least 30cm and about 20-30cm. This ensures that they can see it but it's safely out of the baby's grasp when it moves.
- Even though there is a suggested time frame to use each mobile, observe your baby and change them accordingly. These are only approximate as every baby develops in their own pace.

# How to place a newborn under a mobile?

When you are home from the hospital and settled in a bit, after about two weeks you can introduce the Munari mobile. You can leave your baby on a topponcino, which gives a safe and comfortable environment to explore from.

If your little one is a bit older, place him/her straight on a movement mat, although I would put a muslin cloth under to avoid accidents. (Read about a Montessori baby's workspace in this post). Make sure that s/he is awake, well-rested and ready to 'work'.

If you suspect that your baby has reflux, s/he might become fussy while lying flat on the mat. In this case use something to prop your little one up on, for example a soft blanket, a towel or a nursing pillow.

# What should you do?

There are two Montessori principles which apply here called 'giving time' and 'non-interference'. They pretty much mean what it says on the tin, asking you to give all the time your baby needs and, if possible, trying not to disrupt this intense observation in any way.

Building concentration and learning new visual skills is hard work! What you can do is sit, observe and enjoy watching your little one delight in interacting with the mobiles. Babies are very good at letting us know when they have had enough of this hard work and are ready for a change so follow your child's cues and act on them!
